STATE OF CAMBRIDGE PROFILE OF REPRESENTATIVE

NAME: **Robert Feinstein**
PARTY: **Republican**

DISTRICT: 1ST (includes Gotham City, population 187,000, Bonnyville, 70,000, parts of Boyne and Midland Counties)

The First District is in many ways a microcosm of the State of Cambridge: it is mixed economically, ethnically, and politically. In the east, Gotham serves as a retail, marketing, shipping and insurance center. Bonnyville, once a hub of river and rail transportation in the west, has only recently begun the transition to high technology industry, aided in no small part by the presence of Cambridge Technological University. Outlying areas produce crops for both the urban areas of Cambridge and adjacent states, relying heavily on government programs for both agriculture and shipping. Gotham is 135 miles southwest of Capital City, the state capital of Cambridge.

The First district is slowly evolving from a Democratic stronghold into a competitive two-party district. In 1988 Bush carried the First district, holding Dukakis even in the city, and running well ahead of him in the counties. Clinton carried the district in 1992 and 1996, but just barely, and Perot polled higher than most observers expected. In the 2000 election, it marginally favored George W. over Gore, and the district went for President Bush by a wider margin in 2004. The First is one of the less affluent districts in Cambridge, having suffered from both the tightening of farm credit, and the closure of Decker Air Force Base in recent years, as well as severe job competition between long-time residents and an influx of Asian and Latino laborers.

The population breakdown in the district is as follows: Total: 664,540, an 8% increase since 1990; White: 60%; African-American: 13%; Latino: 17%; Asian: 10%.

THE MEMBER: Rep. Feinstein fits the mold of the liberal Cambridge Republican who draws a hard line on foreign policy but manages to stay on the left wing of the party on domestic issues. Feinstein was an early starter in politics: elected Midland County district attorney while still in law school, Feinstein subsequently gained a reputation as a hard-as-nails crime fighter. Feinstein then went on to serve two terms
